Long term Care Option	Broad Definition	Basic Services Included	Regulatory & Advocacy Oversight
<p>Home & Community-Based Services (HCBS) Known in WI as Family Care, Family Care Partnership</p> <p>Chapter DHS 10</p> <p>Self-Directed Supports - IRIS</p>	<p>Members/Participants receive services where they live.</p> <p>Comprehensive for persons age 18 and older who meet state Medicaid eligibility requirements.</p>	<p>Case management and care coordination, supportive home care, skilled nursing, therapies, employment skills training and pre-vocational training for younger members.</p>	<p>Enrollment via ADRCs; care coordination and services facilitated through Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) as contracted with the State Department of Health Services.</p> <p>Advocacy and rights protections via the Long Term Care Ombudsman Program for persons age 60 and older, via Disability Rights of WI for members age 18 – 59.</p> <p>Self-directed supports in IRIS managed via IRIS Consultant Agency (ICA), with budget managed via the IRIS Fiscal Employer Agent.</p>



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Supported Independent Living Apartments (SIL)	Tenants receive services where they live; tenants may largely be Family Care members or IRIS participants.	Care coordination and services facilitated through Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) or IRIS Consultant Agencies (ICAs) as contracted with the State Department of Health Services.	Advocacy and rights protections for persons age 60 and older via the Long Term Care Ombudsman Program apply only to the Family Care or IRIS service packages vs. landlord-tenant disputes.
Residential Care Apartment Complex (RCAC) Chapter DHS 89	An apartment that includes a kitchen, living area, bedroom and private bathroom. Limitations on tenants with guardianships, activated powers of attorney for health care.	Required: meals, housekeeping, laundry, arranging medical appointments and transportation. May provide up to 28 hours per week of personal care and/or nursing services. (These are generally provided for a fee above the monthly rent.)	"Registered" or "Certified" by the Department of Health Services (DHS). No on-site or annual inspections required, unless certified. No requirement for DHS to investigate tenant complaints, unless certified. Advocacy and rights protections via the Long Term Care Ombudsman Program for tenants age 60 and older.



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<p>Adult Family Home (AFH) Chapter DHS 88</p>	<p>Where 3 or 4 adults, not related to the operator, reside and receive care, treatment and/or services above room and board.</p>	<p>Assistance or supervision with activities of daily living (ADLs). Not more than 7 hours per week of nursing care.</p>	<p>Licensed by the Department of Health Services (DHS). License inspection every 24 months. Division of Quality Assurance investigates complaints. Advocacy and rights protections via the Long Term Care Ombudsman Program for residents age 60 and older.</p>
<p>Adult Family Home (AFH)</p>	<p>Where 1 – 2 adults reside and receive care, treatment and/or services above room and board.</p>	<p>Assistance or supervision with activities of daily living (ADLs). Not more than 7 hours per week of nursing care.</p>	<p>Certified by managed care organizations or IRIS ICA. Certification inspection annually. The certifying managed care organization or IRIS ICA investigates complaints. Advocacy and rights protections via the Long Term Care Ombudsman Program for residents age 60 and older.</p>



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<p>Community Based Residential Facility (CBRF)</p> <p>Chapter DHS 83</p>	<p>Where 5 or more adults reside, who are not related to the operator, in which care, treatment and/or services above room and board are provided.</p>	<p>3 meals per day, plus snacks. Social programs. Assistance or supervision with activities of daily living (ADL's). Not more than 3 hours per week of skilled nursing care.</p>	<p>Licensed by the Department of Health Services (DHS). License inspection every 24 months by the Division of Quality Assurance (DQA). DQA investigates complaints. Advocacy and rights protections via the Long Term Care Ombudsman Program for residents age 60 and older.</p>
<p>Nursing Home</p> <p>Chapter DHS 132</p>	<p>A facility licensed to provide skilled nursing care.</p>	<p>3 meals per day, plus snacks. 24 hour skilled nursing care. Rehabilitative services. Services to meet the psychosocial, emotional and/or physical needs of the resident.</p>	<p>Licensed by the Department of Health Services (DHS). Inspected annually by the Division of Quality Assurance (DQA). DQA investigates complaints. Advocacy and rights protections via the Long Term Care Ombudsman Program for residents age 60 and older.</p>
